Mum lived in Kowloon but went over on the Star Ferry to Hong Kong most days to attend university, to socialize with friends etc. This is referred to in her diary as ferry, going over, over to, or just over. As the diary starts in September 1941 she was living in the family home at 9 King's Terrace (Tak Hing Street) and commuting to Hong Kong via the Star Ferry to attend university, church and most social events. She was eager to move into a student hostel and was on tenterhooks waiting for her father's permission. The general tone is upbeat and reflects Mum's excitement at leaving home and entering the HKU social scene. But is she up to the academic rigors? The diary starts with the ominous entry "Over found out I failed home. Miserable" She quickly recovers from this setback

however, and the positive preppy tone resumes with her teasing the sulky boyfriend, relishing 'he said, she said' contretemps and joining various student societies and sporting events. Murmurs of the war to come are reflected in her 'call up papers' from the ANS and her half-hearted involvement in nursing training courses. The choice of rag week costumes has a bitter irony, as we know the hellish reality that lies a few months in the future. Her Christmas exams are interrupted by the sounds of war as the Japanese attack Kai Tak airfield; many of the boys she flirted with and dated would be dead or incarcerated by the New Year.

I remember having a conversation with Mum where she mentioned persuading her father to allow/pay for her to go to HKU, it being fairly unusual in those days for women to attend

university. I don't believe any of her siblings were similarly privileged, and she was always grateful to her father for allowing her this. Maybe being the eldest daughter gave her an edge; certainly Mum was always a bit of a rebel, her sister Hazel in contrast always being the dutiful daughter (Pc. Antonia). Whatever Mum picked up during her short university career, and more probably during her time as a student at DGS, she paid back in spades teaching English and Cantonese to all and sundry, evident throughout her diary entries. She was a teacher. Even more impressive is her legacy to her Kotwall relatives for whom she found boarding school places at little or no cost, setting them up for the rest of their lives

'I am a teacher of English, not an English teacher!'





September 1941



Mum's 'call to arms' took the form of an OHMS letter dated September 1941 ordering her to make herself available for nursing duties at the outbreak of hostilities with Japan. The original form letter was dated December 1940, since war with Japan had been anticipated and civilian evacuations already taken place. La Salle College Relief Hospital was in Kowloon. A diary entry 17th October 1941 indicates a move to University Hospital.

Hong Kong VRC (Victoria Rowing/Recreation Club) 1940. Looking north from Murray Road to the rowing club and swimming pool. Numerous swimming parties were made to the VRC during Antonia and Jonathan's visit to HK in 1963. Mum was always a keen swimmer, and could breaststroke like a pro. The VRC had an annual swim across the harbor, starting in 1906, that thousands participated in. These stopped in 1978 because of the condition of the water, but were revived in 2011.



Dr. G.A.C. Herklots was a Reader in Biology at HKU who in 1941 had been made head of a newly established Fisheries Research Station. Cambridge educated, he was tasked with developing a 'siege biscuit' to provide the HK population with nutrition during what was seen as a possible 3 month siege. Mum was interested in studying Biology at HKU – hence the contact? On October 15th 1945 Dr. Herklots provided Mum with a letter of reference, the contents of which suggest he was intimate with her circumstances, and was thus probably an important colleague/ friend.



The following entries 19-21st September 1941 are in tiny writing, and were obviously added later in space available.

"Life at HKU was extremely congenial. All students were at that time required to reside in an approved hostel – some were run on the campus by the University itself (May, Lugard and Eliot Halls, now known collectively as 'Old Halls') and three were religious in foundation – St. John's was Church of England, the Jesuits ran Ricci and the London Missionary Society ran Morrison Hall......They were comfortable places where, in one contributor's words, they were treated 'almost like princes', with servants attending to their needs – not unlike their Oxbridge contemporaries. Many came on government scholarships, with the intention of becoming teachers. HKU was a different place then than it is now with a different organization of faculties so that a student could sign up for courses spanning both the arts and the sciences, unless they joined the medical or engineering faculties....."

Cedric Lawrence Salter Birthday - 23rd. Oct.

Ced, Cedric. Mum's steady boyfriend until the invasion, worked or was a student at Peel Labs. HKU an Engineering Laboratory. He was a Brit. from London, and grew up in south London and went to school with my Dad. It was Cedric who told my Dad about Mum, that was to lead to Mum and Dad's eventual meeting up in HK, and eventual marriage in the UK, but all that is to come much later (see Appendix D). A photo taken in early 1941 shows him as a handsome Signalman with the HKVDC.

Cedric (2i) is a constant in Mum's diary until the Japanese capture him and put in pow camp. He comes across as a bit 'clingy' in the diaries, but obviously loves Mum, but is this love reciprocated? Cedric is heavily into cars, and spending time with Ced. meant pottering in the garage with the car, fixing or cleaning the car etc. often to Mum's consternation. I remember Mum telling me about a boyfriend she had with an engine on his kitchen table. Guessing this was Ced.

Ced doesn't like Mum socializing without him and gets jealous. There was also an incident involving a string of pearls thrown into Kowloon Bay.....

A wonderful diary entry dated Nov. 25th 1941 sums up my Mum's teasing attitude towards the long-suffering Ced:

"Was giving ced's date up though intuition told me he would come. He came to hostel around 9. Annoyed because could not go to 8.30 lect. at first because of Mr. X outside."

The Mr. X reference probably refers to Cedric's secret Govt. job mentioned in a 6th Nov. diary entry:

"Ced could not come to "All this and Heaven too" because had to see me**man about "S4" "secret" Govt. Job."

Cedric drinks pints (probably English type beer) Not a good dancer – too self-conscious according to Mum. He encouraged Mum to try and communicate with him using telepathy. Cedric suffers from occasional bouts of malaria.

Cedric's mother and father, Florence and Alfred were also in HK and Alfred receives several mentions in Mum's diary before he was interned in Stanley. The Salters moved out to HK from south London in the 1920's with Dodwell & Co with whom Alfred was a heating and ventilation engineer. Cedric went on to be an apprentice with Dodwell Motors. Cedric's mother died shortly before the invasion, Alfred remarried – and Cedric's younger brother Michael with his stepmother evacuated to Manila (Empress of Asia) and then Sydney, Australia (Christian Hugens). Hong Kong has a monsoon-influenced subtropical climate. It is mild for more than half the year. There are mild, relatively dry winters, and hot, humid, and wet summers. The wettest month is August, and driest January. At the coolest times of the year from mid-December to February, the temperature may fall to 10 °C (50 °F). In the warmest times (late May to mid-September), it averages 28 °C (82 °F). However, it may reach 33 °C (91 °F). Typhoons, tropical cyclones, are rated 1-10. #3 = rain and winds, #8 = stay indoors and away from windows, all public transport including the Star Ferry stops. 9/10 is rare = hurricane strength winds.


"Paddy joining VAD"

The VAD, The Voluntary Aid Detachment was formed to provide civilian aid to military nurses in the two world wars. One of the more famous members in the First World War was Vera Brittain, author of *Testament of Youth*. In HK the VAD became the nursing detachment of the HKVDC – the Hong Kong Voluntary Defense Corps, with over a hundred female members in 1941. Its popularity may have been in part because civilian women were subject to evacuation in 1940, but VAD members were not. It seems, from the names in the list, that almost all the members were European, with very few Eurasians and no Asians, so it may have been that for racist reasons Mum was precluded from joining, however the ANS, the Auxiliary Nursing Service apparently had no such scruples. Members of the ANS were largely Chinese, Eurasian and local Portuguese, with a very few Europeans.

"Letter from Mrs. Gittens to join D.O.G.A."

Diocesan Old Girls' Association. Mum and Jean were both former pupils of Diocesan's Girls School and Mum went on to board and teach there in 1945. 10 years older than Mum, Jean Gittins was a member of the Eurasian intellectual elite in pre-war Hong Kong and the daughter of Sir Robert Ho Tung (see Eurasian). Jean was interned in Stanley Camp and wrote *Behind Barbed Wire* – an account of her internment.

The Canadians Arrive



This was written on the corner of one of Mum's diary pages, much as Dad later wrote his name and address in her diary.

On November 16 1941 two battalions (1,975) Canadian Soldiers arrived to reinforce the Hong Kong Garrison. The Royal Rifles of Canada (from Quebec), and The Winnipeg Grenadiers (Manitoba). Alvin Lester Guy was with the Winnipeg Grenadiers, was injured 22/12/41 (shot in knee) later transported to Japan (Tatsuta Maru) and worked in the Omine coal mine. Died 1982.



And so the last diary entry of 1941 is for Wednesday November 25^{th.} Later (December) entries, as on the 'to do' list page 86, I believe are up coming activities rather than diary entries. What happens to Mum for the remainder of 1941 is uncertain. An account by Dafyd Emrys does little to further our understanding of details:

"The life of the university came to an abrupt halt with the invasion. Those men involved with the Volunteers and the support services were called 'to the colours' and some women found that they had a useful role to play also. But curious though it may seem, information about the precise cataclysmic events happening all around was not easy to come by. Some were drawn directly into the front line and paid the ultimate price; others were lucky but only just. Many went home but some women had a horrendous time...."

Dafydd Emrys Evans from *Dispersal and Renewal: Hong Kong University During the War Years* Sir Lindsay Ride's (prof. of Physiology at UHK and Commander of BAAG) account is a little more illuminating:

"On Sunday, 7 December, the Volunteer Defense Force was mobilized, and this affected over one hundred members of the University. On Monday shortly before 8.30 a.m. other students began to assemble at the Great Hall for the degree examinations, unaware that the Japanese had already launched their offensive (Mum was there and remembers hearing the explosions and sound of firing – with some relief since her exam was curtailed and she did not feel she had revised enough Pc. between Mum and Antonia) When the Kai Tak aerodrome was attacked about 8 a.m., the noise of bombing and anti-aircraft fire was thought by many to be just part of the training exercises for our troops, who were known to be at war stations. When the truth became apparent, examination chairs and tables were moved out of the Great Hall and beds were moved in. In a few hours an emergency hospital, mostly staffed by University people, was ready to receive both sick and wounded."

Presumably Mum responded to her 'call-up' ANS letter (see start of this 1941 chapter) that required her to present herself at La Salle College Relief Hospital (moved to University Hospital see page 72). We know that she nursed Canadian soldiers at some point as both Antonia and I remember her mentioning this, however like many others who suffered at this time, she was mostly silent on her nursing experiences. A diary entry in 1943 (pg. 157) refers to talking of her nursing experiences with Paddy Pasco.

Gwulo.com relates the following regarding what happened to ANS nurses after the surrender of Hong Kong.


"The auxiliary nurses dispersed and returned home following the surrender of Hong Kong. Earlier, at the La Salle College relief hospital following the withdrawal from Kowloon, those who were unable to return home were temporarily held by the Japanese in the Chinese YMCA in Waterloo, and subsequently moved to the Kowloon Hotel."



"Members of the ANS were not interned as such; the few who were interned individually responded as "enemy nationals" to the internment order in January 1942. It appears the ANS was regarded as having been disbanded with the surrender of Hong Kong on Christmas Day, 1941. After the war Florence Wong and her two daughters each received HK\$486.00 as pay and allowances, presumably for the 18 days from mobilisation to the surrender. They were also informed that they were eligible for the Defence Medal."

The following is a letter of support from the vice-chancellor of HKU Duncan Sloss, written when Mum was in the UK in 1946, and gives some idea of Mum's academic progress prior to the Japanese invasion. It describes her as having "some eighteen months work" at the university. This would mean she started at HKU in 1940 and thus it's possible that some of her early diary entries may be for 1940.



"Miss Phyllis Lang was within a few months of her Intermediate Examination when the Japanese invasion put an end to University work. She had some 18 months work at English, French, Psychology and Biology and had done very good work in all these subjects. She was in Hong Kong throughout this period of the Japanese occupation."

"Miss Lang was one of the best students of her year. She is a member of an outstanding family in the Colony which suffered severely during the invasion."



The Japanese Invade Hong Kong

The Japanese invasion from China, across the Gin Drinkers Line started on the 8th December 1941. Indications of the fast approaching Japanese Invasion are not obvious in Mum's Diary, but a closer reading reveals the first rumblings, like distant thunder of an approaching storm. This reflects the somewhat nonchalant attitude of the Hong Kong population in general. Arrogance of the British regarding the capabilities of the Japanese soldiers (poor eyesight, unable to fight at night etc.) no doubt played a part, however indications are that at the higher levels of British Government – the outcome of the Japanese invasion was predicted, and seen as inevitable.

"If Japan goes to war there is not the slightest chance of holding Hong Kong or relieving it. It is most unwise to increase the loss we shall suffer there."

Winston Churchill 1941

"There was a feeling that if Japan really did go to war, there was not the slightest chance of holding or retrieving the Colony. The garrison was symbolical more than real. Only token resistance was expected. In other words, the saying went, "HK, you are on your own."

European 'non-essential' civilians, wives sons and daughters of colonial staff were compulsorily evacuated to Australia and Manila, however this was unpopular with many who avoided evacuation, and some even returned before the invasion. Most of these ended up interned in Stanley Camp for the duration of the war.

Joyce Symons writes of the evacuation: "by the summer of 1941, the first signs of war reached Hong Kong when the Government decided to evacuate all expatriate women and children to Australia. This was a strong hint that Japan would soon declare war itself. Discrimination also came out into the open, with angry voices raised in the Legislative Council when the Government refused to evacuate other local groups – Eurasians and Portuguese – despite their possession of valid British passports. Marjorie (Joyce's sister) and I tried to register for evacuation but were turned down by the authorities who said they didn't know what to do 'with the likes of you'. However, 'the likes of us' were ordered to share in the war effort, with our young men conscripted into the volunteers and trained for battle, and everyone with a non-Chinese name having to take on some kind of war work. I was incensed when some Eurasians escaped all this, simply by adopting Chinese names." Looking at the Stars pg. 23

Once hostilities commenced, families still in Hong Kong, separated from families and news, even when they could plainly hear the gunfire. Often they relied on no more than the bamboo wireless, and the South China Morning Post (which stayed in print throughout the battle, shedding a page or two each day until – by 25 December – it was a single sheet). Banham pg. 215.

On November 6th 1941 2,000 Canadian soldiers arrived, one who wrote his address on the back of one of Mum's diary pages. Mum mentioned nursing injured Canadian soldiers, and trying to dissuade them in their escape plans. In recent times this contingent of troops has been strongly criticized as a token force, and a needless sacrifice of 'colonial troops' by the British. The



Canadian's vehicles and heavy guns never arrived, being diverted to help the American's defend Manila, and they had no air support. The few British Naval Ships and fighter planes left rapidly or were destroyed in the early days of the invasion.

The fight put up by the Canadians and various supporting forces has been much maligned; untrained, inexperienced, and poorly led are criticisms often voiced, however, more recent literature on the subject indicates that over the 18 days prior to surrender, fierce sustained fighting occurred with many acts of extreme heroism. The valiant attempt to defend Hong Kong in the face of overwhelming odds is now well documented, and I found it fascinating reading, but I will leave it to the reader to search this out. Hong Kong surrendered to the Japanese December 25th 1941.

The Hong Kong Volunteer Defense Corps (existed pre-war as Hong Kong Defense Corps) was made up of 2,200 all ranks. As well as British living in HK, it included Eurasian and Portuguese members. During the Japanese invasion:

"The local No. 3 Eurasian machine gun company was half destroyed. These locals were descendants of British who had married Chinese wives in early HK. They were a separate community called Eurasians who had become affluent but were not considered pukka English."

E. Gosano *Hong Kong Farewell*

"The defenders who fought hardest were Eurasian volunteers defending their own homes and families"

Banham pg. 147

Many of Mum's boyfriends were members of the HKVDC and died in the initial fighting (Pc. Antonia, see photo. pg. 432). Three of Mum's future brother-in-law's brothers, Luigi, Jerry and Zinho Gosano were of Portuguese extraction, and although the Portuguese were considered neutral by the Japanese, they chose to fight with the British and served with the HKVDC ending up as pow's. Mum's boyfriend Cedric also served with the HKVDC and shared a similar fate. Jean Gittins, Eurasian, and like Mum a DGS and University Student made the following remarks regarding the effects of the Japanese invasion:

"The Japanese occupiers re-divided the city in terms of race and loyalty, interning soldiers and eventually confining most British and other allied civilians in camps at Stanley. Meanwhile, Chinese and Indians were not to be interned, nor were the sprinkling of Germans who were now allies of Japan. The Eurasians and the Russians, Norwegians and others, although free, were required to carry 'third national' identification passes' Gittins 1982:32



Eventually Mum had one of these passes, which she later refers to losing (misplaced, not taken away, see pg. 209).

Colours were first presented to the Hong Kong Volunteer Defence Corps (HKVDC) in May, 1928. These Colours were buried in December 1941 to prevent them from falling into the hands of the invading Japanese. Those who buried them died as pows and did not reveal the hiding place. Attempts to find them after the war were unsuccessful.

John Charles Lang (Mum's Dad)

Records found on the website hongkongwardiary.com/searchgarrison/nonuniform indicates that Lang, J.C. of 9 Tak Hing St. Kowloon was interned at the New Asia Hotel Room 407 (no date given). This was one of the hotels the Japanese used in January 1942 to intern civilians before moving them to Stanley Camp. Was John interned initially since he was a HK government employee, then released being Eurasian? In any event, the stress on John and the whole Lang family following this event must have been considerable. The following account from Gwelo Old Hong Kong gives evidence of the probable sequence of events, with John being released from the 'January hotels'.

"With every other group there was some ambiguity - Belgian bankers in town were at first treated as enemies and then allowed to live where they chose (although under Kempeitai approval), a self-defined 'white' British subject was refused internment because he was from Ceylon (Sri Lanka), Eurasians seem to have had a degree of choice as to whether or not to enter Stanley (according to Wenzell Brown someone came round the January hotels and told them to go home, but there were a fair number in the camp nevertheless), and, on the evidence available to me, black people did too - and so on."

Cedric Salter

Cedric Salter was in the thick of the fighting from the start. Captain Braude, who Mum was later to teach Cantonese to, had the following to say about Cedric.

"3556, Sigmn, Cedric Lawrence Salter.

Recommended for a decoration in recognition of his exemplary conduct in the face of danger, both on the Mainland and on the Island. He volunteered for dangerous tasks without hesitation and his superiors, both Volunteer and Regular, thought very highly of his courage and daring. Reference should be made to 2/Lt M.G. Carruthers, Sgt. Walker of Armoured Cars,



Lt.Col. S.E. White of Royal Scots. As a Thompson sub-machine gunner, he carried out a number of hazardous tasks at Wong Nei Chong Gap and Tytam Gap. He was with Capt. Fieldon R.A. when that officer was killed. At this time they were carrying out a recce in the enemy lines, Salter and two officers, having volunteered for the task. I ultimately gave him the task of assisting with the maintenance of 'ROSE', Fortress Observation Post, at the Peak, which I was maintaining under shellfire. He was always one of the first to volunteer for any task which appeared to be more hazardous. (signed) A. N. Braude, Captain. O.C. Corps Signals, H.K.V.D.C."

Both Lieutenant Colonel S. White of the Royal Scots and Second Lieutenant M. Carruthers of the HKVDC are mention in *The Damned* by Nathan M. Greenfield. These accounts suggest Cedric was in action early on in the battle for Hong Kong (December 10th) in defense of the Gin Drinkers Line and later (December 19th) in action defending the power station on the north side of the island. The latter was a remarkable action in which a small band of First World War veterans called The Hugheseliers, many in their 70's, repulsed repeated Japanese attacks. Carruthers arrival with 24 HKVDC'ers in three armored cars was ambushed, and only 6 including Carruthers made it to the power station.

My research on Cedric became totally confused when reading Banham's book 'We Shall Suffer There' which contains references to a military Cedric Salter who avoided internment by posing as a Norwegian, and later escaping to China. This was totally at odds with Mum's diary entries, which indicate, along with Cedric's letters, that he was interned in Sham Shui Po pow camp in HK, and ended up in a work camp in Japan. Email contact with Tony Banham (June 21st 2016) confirmed my unlikely conclusion:

Jon.

Thanks for getting in touch.

Yes, there were indeed two!

Salter, Cedric D. Private 3052911 Royal Scots. Ambulance Driver H.K. Hotel Detatched Es.Escaped, hid in Hong Kong for many months, finally reached BAAG and was interviewed 29.3.43

Salter, Cedric Lawrence Signalman 3305 HKVDC W/T Op. (XD3)

The latter is your man. He was a wireless operator in Number 4 Armoured Car in the HKVDC Armoured Car platoon. He was liberated from Innoshima by the Americans and you can see his name on their liberation roster.

Cedric wrote the following note to Mum, probably when he was at the Fortress Observation Post at The Peak shortly before Christmas and the British Surrender. Cameroon is believed to be a card game resembling Poker.




Darling Phyllis,

I've been thinking of you all morning and have been very miserable cause I didn't think I could see you today. I started this letter just after phoning you. I am ringing again in 20 mins. Do you know I was actually crying when I was speaking to you and my eyes are filled with tears now. I get a lovely view of HK and Kowloon from here but unfortunately cannot see your place. I am just round the corner somewhere near where Paddy used to live. The phone just went darling and I thought it was Mr. ady? Its OK to go but it was someone wanting to know if we could see anything.

Well love I'm just back from that long talk with you and have had a look round. I shall be ringing you again at 4:30pm. I do hope to get away tomorrow morning. I want to get you some kind of present for Christmas. I know what one will be – a bottle of nice/rice port? which you need. I can't think what else to get you though, knickers, handbag, fountain pen, something which you can keep forever, please darling telepathize to me this evening what you want. I shall be doing 3 hrs guard tonight so I shall send you something. Darling the machine gun fire seems much further away today than yesterday, so I hope that is a good sign, and believe it is. Darling I love you.







Cedric was interned early on in the invasion, initially at North Point, and later Sham Shui Po pow camps. A mug he inscribed with 'Sham Shui Po Christmas 1941' indicates he was already interned there before the bulk of the military internees arrived in the New Year. With Cedric's incarceration, any relationship with Mum ends, although she does at great personal risk get food through or over the camp fence to him, and receives letters from him smuggled out in the handle of a container (see 1942 diary entries). Ced's father Alfred was interned in Stanley Camp.



Eddie Gosano

"The suffering of the soldiers wounded or trapped in Kowloon is perhaps even greater than that of the civilians: four doctors (Newton, Uttley, Hargreaves and Gosano) are taken by the Japanese from the Kowloon Hotel to the internment camp in Argyle Street where there are about 150 wounded troops (out of 950 in total). There's no operating theatre, no instruments, few dressing materials, almost no drugs, and no nurses, but they do everything they can." From Gwulo Old Hong Kong 23rd December 1941

Mum's future brother in law Eddie Gosano, who married her younger sister Hazel (Jo) was a General Surgeon for the 600 bed Queen Mary Hospital and volunteered to stay and treat the wounded in the days following the invasion.

"Casualties were streaming into the emergency centres in Kowloon. From Monday through Thursday we worked like dogs on casualties without number."

Eddie went on to treat numerous casualties in pow camp before becoming a pow himself. He was eventually given a 3rd National Pass, released, and moved to Macao, pursued his medical practice, courted Hazel and also found time to become the head of the BAAG in Macao. During his time



in HK, following the invasion, Mum's diary indicates he was a frequent visitor and strong support, as he was for the whole of the Lang family during their time as refugees in Macao. I think Hazel eventually forgave my Mum, who she thought was having an affair with Eddie prior to their marriage. Certainly, when as an 11 year old in 1968, and I got to visit my Uncle Eddie in San Francisco, Hazel and Mum seemed to get on OK, but what do children know...

The below letter indicates Grandma was in Macau at the time of the Japanese invasion and British surrender

Thore is Ken. I am very worried about him. I hope to get news of his recovery. Wire me if Hazel's date of leaving is known and let me date of departure. If I send you a wire get collie to go and fetch me. I won't bring much, may be ***** and a few small pieces.

Bea Hutcheon (nee Greaves)

Bea is a student at UHK, mentioned in several of Mum's Diary entries. Like Mum she was Eurasian, served in the ANS and eventually fled to Macau. She married Robin Hutcheon who for many years was editor of the South China Morning Post. Bea describes her wartime experiences which are eerily similar to Mum's including mention of the same people mentioned in Mum's Diary (see Bea's Experience at the end of each years diary). I was able to contact Bea, by email (see pg. 307).

Bea's Experience

"December 25th, 1941 was the worst Christmas in Hong Kong's living memory and mine particularly. My two brothers were fighting on different fronts. John was an Australian pow in Greece (but later escaped) and Stan was in the HKVDC's 4^{th} Battery at Pak Sha Wan, missing in action but later confirmed killed on 19th December. I was half way through my third year in the Arts Faculty studying economics and politics. At that stage I had no fixed career objective in mind. I was 19 years old and enjoying my studies as well as sport – hockey, tennis and athletics. Life was happy though the clouds of war on the horizon made us all wonder what lay ahead. When Pearl Harbour was bombed life changed dramatically. It was 8th December (7th December in Hawaii east of the International Date Line). I first heard of it walking to the University that day to complete mid-term exams when I met a friend who told me there would be no need to go as war had begun. I was advised to go home where I lived with my uncle and aunt (my parents having died in Shanghai years earlier) and to await advice from the University. My next instruction was to become a volunteer nurse under Dr John Mackie who was conducting first aid courses, and present myself to a local hospital in the mid-levels. For the next several days I assisted in treating minor and small-scale injuries which got worse as the intensity of the Japanese shelling increased."

"One of my few recreations was to attend St John's Cathedral on Sundays where I was a member of the choir; otherwise it was dangerous to venture out, with sporadic shelling and air raids by the Japanese invaders. When finally Hong Kong surrendered on 25th December we celebrated a low-key Christmas with friends and a religious group at Nethersole Hospital, and then went home to prepare for the long occupation, hardly a time to think of peace and goodwill.

During the attack on Hong Kong, I used to go out occasionally with my friend Cicely Kotewall (later Zimmern) to sketch scenes, under the tutelage of a Vietnamese artist. But once Hong Kong fell I was advised by my uncle not to go out under any circumstances."



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
